## **Domaine Laurier NV Brut Sparkling Wine**

Fresh and lively, with hazelnut and citrus aromas to a silky texture and delicate balance of richness and cleansing acidity

## **Rimat Chardonnay Unoaked 2005**

Single varietal dry white wine. Harvested in the first half of September, it reveals all the variety's delicate aromas. With intense apple and pineapple characters, it is full-bodied, well-rounded with a lingering, fruity flavour.

## **Pierre Chainier Vovray 2005**

Pale yellow in color. The nose sports the characteristics of Chenin Blanc with ripe fruit aromas Excellent minerality on the mouth with notes of pear and quince

## **Pierre Chainier Rose**

An intense pink robe, with bright salmon colour Fruity and lively The freshness and energy of the wine is perfectly balanced by the semi-dryness

## **Clos de l'Oratoire des Papes**

Châteauneuf-du-Pape

(klo deh low rah twa, shat oh nuf dew pop)

Founded in 1859, the Caves des Papes wine company is located in the largest and oldest cellars of Chateauneuf-du-Pape, the village that was once chosen as a summer residence of the papacy during the 14th century. The Clos de L'Oratoire des Papes wine estate is among the finest properties in this world famous appellation. A unique feature in the heart of the vineyards gives the property its name: an oratory, a place of prayer. Erected in the 18th century and dedicated to Saint Marc, the patron saint of winegrowers, it is believed to help protect the vineyards from storms. One prominent feature of the 50 acres planted for Clos de L'Oratoire des Papes is the carpet of stones ranging from the size of a fist to that of a cantaloupe.

These rocks, left by Alpine glaciers, store the sun's heat during the day and reflect it back to the underside of the vines in the early evening.
